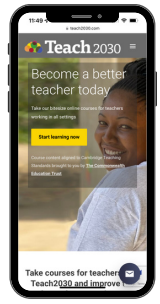


Teacher Development

- One visit per term from an Education Consultant

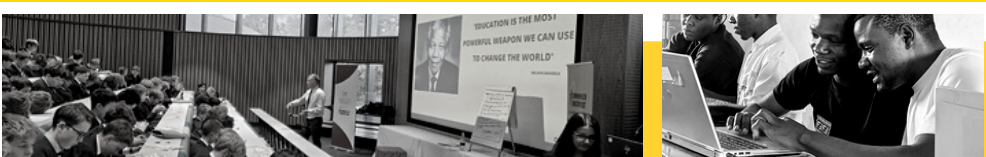
